

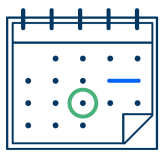


Improving economics teaching and learning for over 25 years

The Economics Network is the largest and longest-established academic organisation devoted to improving the teaching and learning of economics in universities, running training workshops, thematic symposia and Europe's premier international economics education conference.

Subscribing to the EN

The Economics Network is funded primarily through departmental subscriptions. Staff from subscribing departments gain **access to a number of benefits** across all of the Network's areas of activity, including free or discounted registrations for events, training workshops and conferences; departmental advice (for example on the National Student Survey, HEA fellowships & Professional Standards Framework); access to projects, an external examiners database and themed online support.

Training for economists

The Economics Network provides economics-specific training workshops that are offered for free or at significantly reduced rates to members of subscribing departments.

The workshops are facilitated by experienced economics lecturers and complement any generic-based institutional training delegates might receive (and in some institutions exempts attendees from parts of such training). They are fully aligned to the Professional Standards Framework and

can help those working towards Advance HE fellowships either within their own institutions or by direct application.

The EN has its own Virtual Learning Environment and enrolment to a workshop comes with permanent access to all the online course materials.

Economics lecturing

We run an annual two-day training event covering all aspects of excellence in economics teaching, including designing economics modules and assessment, engaging students, efficient planning and marking, using simulations and experiments in class and employing digital technologies effectively. This workshop also offers a one-to-one support session and guidance on making teaching work for your career.

Sessions are designed for those in 'teaching and research' and 'teaching and scholarship' positions, and addresses the expectations, opportunities and challenges presented by both roles. The workshop is mapped to the PSF and is most relevant for those applying for Advance HE Fellow or Senior Fellow (FHEA and SFHEA).

Example registration fees (2026): £50 for attendees from subscribing departments, £150 for attendees from non-subscribing departments.

Teaching in small-group settings

Our workshops for those who are new to, or looking to upskill in, teaching economics in small-group settings are one-day events aimed at developing core teaching practice. The sessions cover your role and responsibility as seminar leaders, setting expectations, incentivising active learning in economics and efficient marking and feedback. Subscribing departments can host a workshop in their institution if there is sufficient local demand. We have also introduced an online session on effective marking and feedback during the exam period.

Registration fees (2026/27): free for attendees from subscribing departments, £50 for attendees from non-subscribing departments.

Themed events

The EN runs online events in response to the community's needs, addressing a new theme each year. We welcome suggestions for these events from subscribing departments and offer co-hosting opportunities. Events from recent years include:

- Applying for Principal Fellowships and HEA National Teaching Fellowships
- Teaching and learning in a blended world
- Future-proofed assessment
- Teaching with data

Developments in Economics Education Conference



The Network runs Europe's premier international economics education conference. The Developments in Economics Education (DEE) conference is biennial and is hosted by a different subscribing university each time.

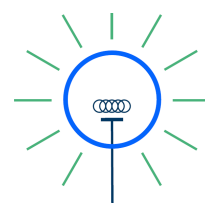
The DEE conference offers academics the opportunity to present and learn from new and innovative economics pedagogy. On the feedback forms for DEE2025, 100% of respondents said they would encourage a colleague to come to a future DEE conference.

Registrations for attendees from subscribing departments are offered at a significant discount.

Resources and publications

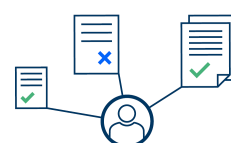
The Handbook for Economics Lecturers

We publish, and continually update, an online handbook currently with 26 chapters, each with research-based advice and practical tips. A separate individual handbook caters for GTAs. The handbook is a companion to our workshops, but can be used independently.



Teaching case studies and briefings

We have published more than 300 case studies of innovation in economics teaching, from classroom experiments to video production. Like the handbook, the case studies emphasise practical tips that lecturers can implement in their own practice. Case studies are published rapidly and provide an easy way to begin publishing pedagogical research.



EN resources

Academics can access a vast bank of resources, including worked examples, datasets and slides, that can be downloaded and used directly in the classroom. They cover topics including:

Research projects



Academics from subscribing departments have the opportunity to take part in the Network's research projects. These have included surveys of employers, alumni and teaching staff as well as analysis of National Students Survey and UCAS data. Our most recent projects have looked at the role of teaching-track staff in HE economics and the effects of the pandemic on teaching and learning in economics.

Databases

External examiners

We run an online database of external examiners, showing their subject expertise and recent experience. Heads of departments at subscribing institutions can request access by emailing: econ-network@bris.ac.uk.

Question bank

An archive of assessment questions submitted by the economics academic community, from which you can assemble, view and print exams or tests. It now has 726 multiple-choice and 577 essay questions, plus more than 100 problem sets.

Jobs for economists

We have a page listing job vacancies and other opportunities for economists both in the UK and abroad on our website. Listings from subscribing departments are more prominent and appear at the top of this page.

Subscribing departments have access to the external examiners and question bank databases and their job opportunities are displayed with more prominence on the website.

Bespoke support for departments

The Economics Network offers additional *ad hoc* support to subscribing departments, whether to find speakers for events, provide input on departmental away days/meetings, or advise on specific topics, including (but not limited to): improving NSS scores, internationalisation, employability, teaching and assessment quality or designing curricula.



Further information

In addition to the benefits listed above, departments' subscribing status is listed on the Economics Network website and they can use this in any promotion materials for their department, as an indication of commitment to excellence in teaching and learning.

Subscription rates are annual and calculated based on full-time equivalent (FTE) numbers of staff. For the 2026/27 academic year, these are:

- £250 for departments with under 10 FTE
- £1,000 for departments with 10-19 FTE
- £2,000 for departments with 20-40 FTE
- £3,000 for departments with over 40 FTE

We also offer a higher rate subscription (£5,000) - departments paying this rate have their institution's logo displayed on every page of the EN website. They will also be prioritised for hosting training workshops and other events and benefit from additional support, for example for departmental away days.
